



## Introduction


- As climate change rapidly advances, there has been a large increase in climate refugees
  - People that leave their native countries due to catastrophic natural disasters caused by global climate change
- In 2016, 24 million people have been displaced from their homes (2).
- Most refugees come from African, Latin American, and western Asian countries (2).
  - Already have limited (unfairly distributed) resources
- Leave behind their old lives
- May face discrimination in their new country

- Difficulties being categorized as refugees due to conflicts and economic pressures
- Legal restrictions regarding immigration




